Make frequent sounds and vocalizations as it provides a foundation for future word learning. Feel free and try to add 2-syllables to the sounds during play!



## Animal Toys

Moo, baa, woof, quack, ruff-ruff, oink-oink



## Toy Food

mmm, ewww, yum, yucky, bleh



## Toy Vehicles

vroom, zoom boom, bang, uh-oh, crash, choo-choo, honk-honk



## Tea Party

glug-glug, mmm, ohh, oops, oopies, oopsie daisies



## Band Aid

ow, ouch, ou, boo



## Playground

Wii, wow, oh, few, yah-yah, yay, yip-pee



## Feelings

yuck, bleh, pee-you, uh-oh



## Photo books

ahh, oh, aww, snap, cha-ching



## Stuffed Toys

peek-a-boo, achoo (sneeze), wahhh (baby crying)



## Everyday Sounds

ring-ring, tick-tock, brrrm (vacuum), pop-pop (popcorn/bubbles)

Little ones in the first 12 months love sound! These vocalizations are easy to produce for them. As well, the vocalizations can allow little ones to learn that sounds and later words carry value with meaning and intent as they grow older.
